


### **Childs Month Activities**

Residents have been concerned that the absence of streetlights increases their feeling of insecurity and makes many residents uncomfortable in having to walk especially at nights. Discussions are afoot to get more police patrol at night in these targeted areas.

Another issue of great concern was the need for clean water throughout the division.

We were pleased to also have the participation of other stakeholder partners including: members of the JCF, representatives from HEART/NTA and the National Water commission, Members of the Rockfort Football club Residents joined us in these discussions and we are heartened by the warm welcome and enthusiastic proposals received.

#### Education

The Norman Gardens focus big on Education. This we believe to be an important cornerstone of ensuring that our children and youths are prepared for any upcoming learning opportunities. MP Phillip Paulwell along with Councillor Jacqueline Lewis combine efforts continue to assist with back to school assistance.

Approximately 600 persons receiving scholarship, book voucher's and grants during the period July to August 2018 Students were assisted with the purchase of school books, the payment of tuition fees, the distribution

of three hundred (300), school bags and school supplies were realized at back to school event and health fair the Norman Gardens Health Centre. In addition to school supplies resident had access to medical services

Thirty (30) students got a chance to get their school medical free of cost by the community doctor Stacy Roach. 75 adults and children

assessed the services of a dentist and got extractions or cleaning done. The Division also had on hand Government agencies including TRN, NIS, and HEART



NTA offering their services.

#### Employment and training **Opportunities**

Each year we seek to get as many persons as possible enrolled in training programs offered by various institutions and promotes those that are being offered to our community. This year the councillor made a value effort coupled with strident advocacy, and was successful in her endeavors in getting the HEART Trust NTA career coach in all eight Communities at least once every guarter to recruit person for Skills training program. Over 200 prospective trainees were registered.

Pleasant Height are employed as recruitment officers.

This year the Division was the recipient from a specai trainning in

Mixology. 13 people sat the examination and was sucessful and are awaiting graduation . Two people so far gained employment. Thanks to the propaitor of Danny Mariner's for allowing these trainee to use the Bar in his establisment.



Let me thank those companies in the Division who continue to employ persons who live in the community. The M.P and Councillor continue to promote those opportunities of which they are aware. In addition we are happy to report on the following:

Farm Work - a total of 15 overseas employment application forms were distributed to individuals within the Division. All have been submitted to the Ministry of labor interview and the selection process as completed .all except two persons were successful and are awaiting medical.

Recommendation from the councilor and MP result in 5 person been employed at Brayan Service station in Liguanea

A total of sixty people were given temporary employment on a quarterly basis on the high way leading from the roundabout at Harbor view to Michel Manley Bolivar through the National Solid Waste management Authority. These people are recommended by the councilor and M.P to the agency.

Sweeper Road Major road ways Ten (10) enjoy temporary rotation employment to carry out sweeping on the main road from Mineral Bath to Mountain view each morning from Sunday to Friday during the hours of 6am to 8am

Christmas Work Program - Over 400 persons were mobilized in December 2018 to clean verges, bush open spaces. This provided an opportunity for temporary employment of laborers, persons operating whackers and that providing garbage removal.

Short Term Poverty Reduction Program - 10 persons from the Norman Gardens Division benefitted from grants awarded by the Member of Parliament. These grants are meant to improve entrepreneurship in the Division and to lower unemployment.

National Youth Service - These programs employ students from the secondary and tertiary levels providing well needed work experience and back to school assistance.

Chicken Rearing - 10 persons received 50 - 100 chickens each while two person from Harbor Heights receive piglets for the councilor's rotation project as an alternate entrepreneurial activity.

Improving our infrastructure In keeping with the desire of residents for a clean, safe and thriving community, Councillor Jacqueline Lewis and MP Paulwell have combined their efforts and have been able to complete the rehabilitation and total resurface of Everest Drive, Hillside Crescent, Norman Avenue, Ellis Avenue, Jackson Lane, and Crawly Road Rashford. We are however aware of the fact that there is need for repairs on several others road way in the Division and will continue our vigorous advocacy for other to be repaired.

Drain cleaning activities provided temporary employment for over 50 residents for work in the Harbour Heights, Rennock Lodge, Burger and Community and along the Sir Florizel Glasspole Boulevard.

#### Welfare

Over 75 packages, sponsored by the Member of Par-

liament, were distributed to Shut Ins by the Councillor and her Executive Team.

Our annual Easter program this year included buns and cheese for over 500 persons. Many thanks to our M.P. Phillip Paulwell

There were Persons from the division, seeking assistance to bury their loved ones. Unfortunately these requests have been in excess of our usual numbers and have totally depleted allocation for such requests. However assistant for 10 buses was We all so assist with equipment for income earning tour seniors.
